

In this fourth presentation for AY2022, of the Interagency Brown-Bag Lecture Series co-hosted by the U.S. Army Command and General Staff School and the CGSC Foundation's Simons Center for Ethical Leadership and Interagency Cooperation, Mr. Michael D. Formica, deputy to the commanding general, U.S. Army Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth, will lead a discussion about the Senior Executive Service – its origins, roles and responsibilities, and the selection process. He will also discuss the Army Civilian as a member of the Army Profession and the critical role civilian professionals play in national security.



Mr. Michael D. Formica was selected to the Senior Executive Service in 2010 and has served as the deputy to the commanding general, Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth since 2019. Previously he served as the director, U.S. Army Installation Management Command, Europe from 2015-2019, and as the assistant deputy chief of staff G-3/5/7 and deputy G-3 for training, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command, Fort Eustis, from 2010-2015. Mr. Formica retired from the U.S. Army in 2009 as a colonel after 27 years of service with duties that included service as the chief of staff and director, Joint Training and Operations Directorate, Joint Forces Command, and as the commander 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, during Operation Iraqi Freedom II.
